The Department of Management launched a mock business competition in the auditorium of North Campus on April 2nd, 2015. The competition is the first trial for many freshers to gain some social experience in college.

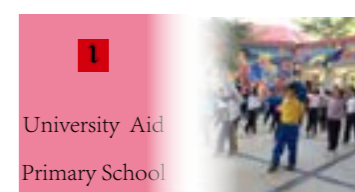
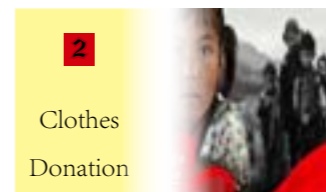
